## **Vestry Report March 2018**

The Vestry gathered on July 3rd for its last meeting of the vacancy. The following matters were discussed:

- 1. Creation of office space. VSec reported that space had been made available in the lower hall for vestry papers to be stowed, including policy documents such as our Health & Safety policy where they would be available for general access. Archived copies are now in the old boiler room. It was reported that the 'Accident Book' was missing a replacement has been placed in the Flower Vestry.
- 2. Data Protection (GDPR). Following excellent work by Henry Douglass, our GDPR policy is fit for purpose and in place. A copy of our policy is available in the Lower Hall and on the website.
- 3. Safeguarding. A Provincial Safeguarding Audit had been completed and sent off on behalf of St Michaels, for which we received grateful acknowledgement. The Vestry were reminded that, as Trustees, we are all responsible for safeguarding; it is not just the Vulnerable Persons Protection Officer's job.
- 4. Repurposing Dean Beard Memorial Fund. Thanks to good work by Mr Sadden, OSCR approval has now been given for the repurposing of the 'Dean Beard Memorial Fund'. This releases funding we could not otherwise have used.
- 5. Financial Update. Highlights from the period April-August 2018 were as follows:
- a) Accounts. We had £33,819 in the current account and £27,767 in the Premium Account.
- b) Expenditure. Significant bills paid recently are:
- (i) Charitable giving from church funds: £2547.60 to Contraflow (£147.60 was from the Advent service). £1,000 to the Beacon Trust. £300 to Helensburgh Food Bank. Appreciative thank you letters had been received from each of them.
- (ii) Significant bills paid: £677 for rectory energy. £1,797 for removals. £1,728 for rectory garden tree cutting and new fence.
- c) Rectory refurbishment. Spend so far had been £14,609. Still to be paid: £4,800 to Fusebox for electrical work. £4,000 to Rowatts for carpets. £2,000 to C Gourlay plumber. £4,600 to Howdens in relation to kitchen refitting. £1,450 for rectory garden path (offset by a £700 donation).

Rectory refurbishment was completed, ahead of schedule, and at a cost of

around £30,000, which is an immense saving on the cheapest quotation we had, £75,000.

The Vestry agreed that a huge vote of thanks is due to Mark and Janina Duncan for their management of the rectory refurbishment, which has resulted in a beautiful rectory that should not need much spending on it for a while and a very substantial saving in cost compared with all of the quotes received. A small gift for Mark Duncan was agreed as a token of our thanks for the work, and time, that he has devoted to the project.

- d) Donations towards the servery. We had a number of donations which, together with the £2,500 raised over the 150th Anniversary w/e, meant that the tea/coffee servery project was affordable, including a change to the specification to a commercial design dishwasher which will complete its wash cycle in about 90 seconds.
- e) Forthcoming expenditure. There will be a bill of at least £1,400 to treat the dry rot in the crypt area, and in the upper hall porch. The rectory shed will cost just under £1,000. Replacement church chairs cost £2,000 approximately (but we had a generous anonymous donation to cover this). From 23rd July Council Tax for the rectory will start up again, and from 1st August we will be paying the rector's stipend.

The Treasurer's report concluded by stating that, once bills have been paid, our current account will have reduced to around £9,000. Although we will need to continue to be careful financially, we have not had to call on our reserves.

#### 6.0 Property Matters:

Highlights from the Property Manager's Report were as follows:

- a) Rectory work. Thanks to the efforts of volunteer working parties, the rectory garden had been cleared, and new paths laid. The beds adjacent to the building had been cleaned out to prevent damp ingress. The rectory garden now has the potential to become an attractive feature.
- b) Dry Rot. Dry rot has been found in the Old Boiler Room, the crypt area rear exit door frame and the entrance porch to the upper hall. Corrective action is in hand.
- c) Church chairs. Following an incident when a stacking plastic chair collapsed, luckily without injury being caused, our stock of church chairs had been examined, and the majority were disposed of because of rust in the welds.

These chairs date back to the 1970s, so they have done well, but replacements were required. The Property Manager had recommended a padded design at a cost of around £26 a chair, and it was agreed that 72 would be ordered.

- d) Gutters. Work is required to rectify problems with church gutters following damage caused in last winter's excessive snowfall.
- e) Water ingress. Water has got into the Flower Vestry. There is a problem with the flat roof, which is under investigation.
- 5. Security. Mysteriously, someone had removed some posters from our notice board in Princess Street. This would have required access to the key safe, which has highlighted the question of who held the combination. It was decided that the Vestry needed to regain control of keys access. It was agreed that the old key safe (which was on its last legs anyway) would be replaced (estimated cost £90) and a review of keyholders would take place.
- 6. Vale of Leven (VOL) Tea Bar. Judith Adams, who is now the sole co-ordinator of the VOL tea bar roster, had asked for Vestry support. St Michaels is one of 12 church groups that run the tea bar, our week of duty comes up every 3 months, and the duty requires a pair of volunteers to fill 3 time slots each day. We are down to only 35 volunteers and completing the roster has been an increasing struggle. The Vestry noted that the tea bar has been in operation since 1996, and it was agreed that fulfilling our commitment was an important element of 'outreach'.

Judith Adams asked for: a. More committed volunteers; b. Some help with coordinating the roster; Vestry support in reducing the time slots from 3 a day to 2 a day which means only 20 volunteers would be needed for our week of duty.

The Vestry agreed to assist in the recruitment of more volunteers, including an additional co-ordinator. The change in duty slots so that fewer volunteers would be needed was endorsed.

7. Service sheets. We will not be using the 'Redemptorist' style service sheets from 5th August, a new style sheet having been agreed with our new Rector. A draft alternative Liturgy was noted by the Vestry pending formal consultation and explanation as required by Canon 22.

Please remember that there are no requirements for joining MU except a belief in the value of family life – that means that, in spite of the name, anyone (male, female, married or single) can join. We are not a bunch of little old ladies sitting round, drinking tea and knitting – even if we look like that! We have very interesting speakers, take part in all kinds of events and support many different causes. You are welcome even if you just want to come along to some of our meetings.

Our Autumn programme continues on **Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> September at 1:30pm** when Ian Davis will talk about 'Visiting Friends'.

On **October 2**<sup>nd</sup> **at 1:30pm** Jacqueline from Boots will talk about the NHS Minor Ailment Service at the local pharmacy.

We are planning to have another 'Desert Island Discs' event in the Church on **Friday 5th October at 7:30pm** when we hope to invite Rosemary and Michael Wilson to choose their eight records.

On **Thursday October 18th at 10:30am** Barbie Paterson will talk about the Contact Centre in Helensburgh.

Our program continues in November with a Heartstart training session with Sheenah Nelson on **Tuesday 13**<sup>th</sup> **November at 1:30pm**.

On **Thursday 29th November at 10:30am**, Marjory Barrington will talk about using music as great therapy for people with Dementia.

I hope there will be something to interest every member of the congregation. I look forward to seeing you!

## From The Rt. Revd. David Chillingworth

I went over to Helensburgh on Saturday to preach at the Institution of Revd Dom Ind. Dom has been Rector of Bridge of Allan for the last ten years – Director of Ordinands in the Diocese of St Andrews. Beside all that, he has acted as my Chaplain – sorting out Orders of Service for the 'big event' so that they were the best that we could do and standing just behind my left shoulder making sure that I didn't get lost or wield mitre or crozier inappropriately.

#### **SERMON AT INSTITUTION**

"Dom, do you in the presence of this congregation commit yourself to this new trust and responsibility?"

"By the help of God, I do."

The act of Institution of a new Rector to St Michael and All Angels here in Helensburgh is a simple thing. God's and Dom's obedient response meet one another. The new Rector is seated and blessed by the Bishop and it is done.

But of course, there's more - the sadness of people from Bridge of Allan — and the anticipation of people here in Helensburgh. The people of Bridge of Allan know for better or worse what Dom is like - mainly for better, I must say. The congregation here waits to see how it will be. Understandably you may forget for a moment that the continuity of a congregation is in its people - while clergy come and go.

The readings which we have heard today are full of challenge. St Paul speaks of the gifts of God to his people. We wonder what gifts the new Rector will have – how will he measure up as apostle, prophet, evangelist, pastor and teacher? Even more importantly, we want to know in these more managerial times whether he can read a financial statement with real insight and whip up a new website for the congregation.

And there are some questions which members of a congregation can reasonably ask. Will he be pastorally faithful? Will he treat worship as the spiritual focus of the life of the congregation and will he work hard at it? Will he be kind? Will he know how to speak the truth which has to be spoken – to speak clearly when it is needed – but to speak with compassion and without anger in a way which can be heard and understood.

But of course, Paul's words are really about the gifts which God places in the community of faith so that the whole body may build itself up in love.

## From The Rt. Revd. David Chillingworth (Continued)

The Gospel of John reminds us that this is all about knowing ourselves loved by God and learning to love one another in return. It is about the spiritual quality of God's people — rooted in the love of God - chosen and called to be the people of God and to do the work of God.

Dom believes in vocation. He has served as Director of Ordinands in the Diocese of St Andrews mentoring people who are exploring God's call. He has stood at my left shoulder as my Chaplain through many Institutions like this one; through Ordinations and Consecrations of Bishops watching as now in the action of the worship the call of God and our response. He has a strong sense of his own priestly calling and his particular calling to be here in Helensburgh. Dom and I, as he once said to me, are 'hard core Anglicans'. We are unapologetic about the strengths of the Anglican way in worship, deep thinking, spirituality and a governance which combines democratic patterns with the authority which comes from office.

Clergy are not always kind about one another. But they would be generous in what they would say about Dom. They would talk about his spirituality, his personal spiritual discipline and his ability to open doors for people to new depths of experience of the living God. They might mention that in that sense it is spirituality which is the greatest tool of mission in a secular society. They would mention his work in inter-faith relationships and with students. They would talk about how he took a simple church building and with a few tasteful changes and many tea lights made it a holy place which spoke of worship and prayer. They would talk of hard work, discipline and straightforwardness. They would mention that Dom and Anna together are a formidable and rich partnership in ministry. I might mention his desire always to have a car several sizes bigger than mine.

It's an honour for me to be here today to commend Dom to his new congregation and I thank Bishop Gregor for his gracious invitation. I have often said that the time for appointing a new Rector is when the vocation of the Priest and the vocation of the congregation are aligned. Dom has no doubt of his calling here. In his ministry here, he will lead the congregation to recognise its own calling. He will foster and encourage that calling and the gifts which God gives to go with it. May the time to come be one of rich blessing.

## **Reflections on the Vacancy**

When David announced that he was retiring, Jianping and I were sorry to see him go. He had been most kind and supportive to us when we needed it most. However, the Vestry knew that it was incumbent on us all to prepare for and play our part in the process. David gave some helpful advice, but it was the Bishop who personally guided us through the whole period.

I was greatly encouraged when I discovered that most of the vacancies in the diocese were being mentored by Dean Ian Barcroft but that we were considered such an important charge in the diocese that Bishop Gregor wished to help us personally.

Nick Davies' leadership and Kevin's hard work made the whole process

seem quite seamless. Kenny Macaulay's light touch as interim priest-in-charge, Sally Gorton's management of visiting Priests and Pat Smith's period as Associate Priest gave us both spiritual continuity and some delightful sermons. obvious joy at officiating in St. Michaels' was a highlight of the vacancy. The visiting priests were all a great pleasure to meet.

The saddest moment for me was the news of Maggie Sheen's illness and subsequent retirement as Lay Representative. Her knowledge and deep faith and friendship as I grappled with being her alternate and the pleasure of her company when travelling together to North-West Regional Council Meetings will always remain with me.

We now have a new Rector in an improved Rectory, a new servery in the hall, painting done in the Church, and a host of other matters giving rise to hope in the future life of our church.

Recently, Joan Sadden showed me a booklet called the "Compassionate Shopping Guide" which I found to be a real eye opener. Many people, myself included, understood that when the law banning the testing of cleaning products, skincare preparations and perfumes on animals came into force in 2013 that was the end of this dreadful practice. On reading the booklet I was shocked to discover that this is not so. Although animal testing is against the law in Britain and EU countries, many of the ingredients used in the manufacturing process come from outwith the EU from countries where animal testing is carried out. This applied, to my horror, to the shampoo I use and to cosmetics and perfume in common use.

Own brand cleaning products from the Co-op and Waitrose comply with animal testing criteria but Boots own preparations do not!

I have obtained further information which I will be happy to pass on to anyone who shares my concern for animal welfare.

## **Personal Data**

As part of the exercise to ensure we comply with new Data Protection Regulations we have found over twenty groups within our congregation. We do understand that each group leader or coordinator needs to know who the members are and how they can be contacted.

So if you are a leader, or coordinator of a St Michaels group and have a circulation or distribution list, or a set of email contacts which contain a person's name plus one or more of the following; address, telephone number, or email address you are holding personal data which can identify that individual and this is to be protected.

## **Personal Data (Continued)**

To help you here are a set of practices which we want to encourage you to follow when using and publishing this personal data.

- NO identification of addressees on a distribution list from any email is permitted. All the people on your distribution lists should be addressed "bcc" (blind carbon copy).
- If a member of the group asks for his or her personal data to be withheld, remove it and inform the data controller that's me.
- Data no longer required must be removed and the Data Controller informed of changes to a list.
- Computers and USB drives on which data is kept should have appropriate security (passwords).
- If data is to be transferred through memory sticks, CD-ROMs or via email then consult with the Data Controller before you make a transfer.
- Personal data stored in manual form should be held where it is not readily accessible to those who do not have a good reason to see it.
- The Vestry Secretary as Data Protection Compliance Officer is to be informed immediately if any personal data goes missing.

All this may seem a bit much, but we are complying with the regulations to ensure your personal details remain in the hands of people who will protect your identities.
